Northeast Oregon workshop: This workshop, held Wednesday afternoon, took a close look at local prescribed fire implementation in northeast Oregon. It focused on bringing together local actors and identifying future projects and opportunities.

Field tour of three sites around Baker City: Thursday began with a PowerPoint presentation and discussion on the Little Dean Prescribed Fire plan. With added context of the area, we then headed out to visit three sites: Little Dean, Auburn BLM Feed Station, and Deer Creek. In depth discussions focused on burn plans, before and after effects, BLM burning, ODFW burning, and ODFW-ODF's Burn Agreement.

Working session: Preparing for OPFC Strategic Plan Update: As the 2019-2022 OPFC **Strategic Plan** expires, the OPFC continued to brainstorm ideas for drafting up the new 2023-2025 Strategic Plan. The group self-selected into one of three breakout groups: Policy Goals, Workforce Development, and Outreach and Communications. Participants were asked to go through the existing Strategic Plan and think about overarching statewide needs of the OPFC -- does anything need updating? is anything missing, outdated or irrelevant? what measurable action items need to be added? what changes need to be made? After about 30 minutes, the subgroups returned and reported out. Discussion will inform development of the draft strategic plan, which will be provided to the Executive Board for their review.
